
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FROM RABBI FERSKO

Friends, we've come so far. In the three years since the devastation of the pandemic, we have all but rebuilt our special community. Our congregational membership is on the rise and our religious school enrollment has grown by leaps and bounds. New leaders have stepped forward and longtime leaders have deepened their commitment to us. We've fed hundreds of hungry people in our neighborhood, and we've welcomed a family of Ukrainian refugees into our community. In the midst of it all, we've transformed our building—our sanctuary is new—from the chairs to the *Torah* covers to the carpet, and our social hall is refreshed and re-floored. This year, as we launch

our **Above and Beyond Campaign**, we are asking you to help us finish what we started.

In the old days, there were many aspects of temple life that were very different from today's Village Temple.

First, our clergy were men, and it took a long time before we had a woman president. For many years, the building at 33 East 12th Street served most of our needs. All of our services took place there, as well as the Religious School, Board meetings, the Soup Kitchen, rummage sales, bazaars, and street fairs. And, believe it or not, in order to accommodate the entire congregation, we had double services for the High Holy Days. As you can imagine, there was occasionally some consternation about who got early services, and who got late ones. As Chairman of the High Holy Day committee for several years, I had the fun of placating members who were unhappy about their assignments.

Yet as much as things have changed, there has been a constancy about our synagogue. Recent Physical Changes to The VT

PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS

In the last five years, the temple has undertaken a series of improvements that dramatically enhanced the experience of those who use the building for work, worship, and education. None of it could have happened without the generosity of Carol Swedlow and Jamil Simon, two of our long-time members.

We have upgraded the flooring and painted the second-floor classrooms. The Rabbi and staff offices are far more welcoming, with new carpet, new paint, new lighting, and new desks. This summer we will finish the renovation of the second floor, through the addition of an acoustic partition for classroom support, a new ceiling and lighting.

Just as our community is going through renewal, our sanctuary has been beautifully refurbished with new carpeting, flexible seating, and fresh paint. The lighting will be brighter soon; we are in the process of removing and replacing the sconces.

We have improved our ability to get maximum use out of limited space. In the social hall, which doubles as classrooms, we installed a movable acoustic partition that has greatly helped contain noise during class hours. We also installed a maple hardwood floor in the social hall that should wear well for a long time and replaced the flooring in the kitchen on the first floor.

SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS

Our synagogue is also becoming more secure. Following a security assessment as part of a grant obtained through the hard work of Barbara Gerolimatos, we will be installing comprehensive upgrades, including attack-resistant doors and glazing, door frames and locks. Many of these changes may not be noticeable, but they will significantly increase our ability to protect our guests and staff. We will also be replacing the fire and security alarms.
