This July 1st marked a very special milestone in my professional journey here at The Village Temple. On this day back in 2005, I started my tenure as the newly appointed Director of Education at The Village Temple and this new, 2022-2023/5783 school year will be my 18th year in this role. It has been a great privilege and honor to serve the amazing Village Temple community for such a long time, to be able to meet so many wonderful families and watch so many children grow right before my eyes. It is amazing to realize that so many of my former preschoolers are college graduates now! It gives me a deep sense of joy and accomplishment that hundreds of children participated in our education program during my tenure. During the previous, 2021-2022/5782 school year when we resumed our in-person programming, we learned a great deal about navigating COVID-related protocols and restrictions, about keeping the health of our students, faculty, and staff a priority, and about reintroducing our most beloved programs and activities into our Religious School operation. It was a challenging year but toward the end of it in April and May we resumed most of those special features that make our Religious School what it is—the place where kids want to be, where their friends are, and where their time in the classrooms is filled with fun games, creative learning, and engaging hands-on projects.

What This Fall Will Bring

Throughout this year we will be offering many opportunities for family engagement ranging from holiday celebrations to family services and parent socials. When we begin our Religious School programming this Fall, we will use this knowledge and expertise combined with our vision for excellence and offer an amazing Religious School

experience that inspires learners of all ages, that makes them realize that their Temple is their spiritual home, and that teaches them important lessons about our heritage, traditions, ethics and commitment to social justice. This year our younger students will continue their exploration of Jewish symbols and stories, Jewish heroes and *mensches*, the Jewish holiday cycle, and our Jewish values. Our older students will delve into exciting learning structured around the weekly *Torah* reading cycle. Their weekly exploration of our most sacred text, its stories, commentaries, and teachings will provide learners with a solid foundation in preparation for their *Bar* and *Bat Mitzvah*. And all students will be working and making solid progress on Hebrew *alef-bet* and Hebrew reading according to their grade levels and individual skills.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

The 2022 Mid-term Elections are coming! The VT Social Action Committee (SAC) is leading the way and encourages ALL congregants to take part in <u>Every Voice</u>, <u>Every Vote</u>—a non-partisan postcarding campaign. The <u>Religious Action Center</u> of <u>Reform Judaism (RAC)</u> and <u>Center for</u> <u>Common Ground</u> provide a culturally sensitive script, which includes key issues at stake and addresses and names of under-represented voters.

Handwritten postcards are a form of personal connection and can "be a bridge" for infrequent voters to become empowered voters! In North Carolina for example, postcarding efforts resulted in a 23% increase of Black voters re-registering to vote, and in Georgia, 3.3% of 143,000 purged voters


registered to vote. In some cases, these voters were "unreached" by other modalities such as those without phone numbers or with new addresses (https://drive.google.com/file/d/1V_ Ep0KF3TnewrbMSYOV_n2OHsLgNLysY/view). Additionally, postcarding can be a fun, simple and meaningful social activity for friends and family.

As of time of this writing, The Village Temple members have written and sent over 900 postcards to citizens for the Florida and
